As explained in his book "Three Cups of Tea," not only was education the only tactic to combat poverty, but poor hygene and lack of clean drinking water made it that one in three children died before they were 1 year old. Thus to accomplish his mission, he had to create water projects in remote areas that would bring fresh spring water to public taps in remote villages. Because the women and children no longer had to walk long distances to find clean water, he was able in one year to cut the infant mortality rate in half in every village he worked with. In Northern Pakistan, he helped construct their first water pumping station, clearwell and reservoir for a refugee tent city built in a desert for 5,000 people. All in all, in the last decade, he has helped build 55 schools in the forbidding terrain of Pakistan and Afghanistan, as well as numerous water projects, in the forbidding terrain that gave birth to the Taliban. His story is at once a riveting adventure and a testament to the power of the humanitarian spirit.
